Welcome to our very first Trust newsletter! We hope to make this a regular quarterly update on matters concerning the Hampton & Richmond Borough FC Supporters Trust and also to update members on the wider issues facing supporters' trusts up and down the country and in the non league arena in particular.

To bring you up to date, the Trust held its inaugural Open Meeting on 14th January when the idea of a Trust was overwhelming endorsed by a vote of 66 votes to Nil. Since that time, working parties have been set up to establish the framework of the Trust and propose an initial Trust board to carry the Trust through to its first democratic elections which are

likely to be held later this year.

We have set up a Trust website at www.hrbfcst.co.uk which will also carry regular news updates and membership application forms which can be downloaded.

The Trust was officially established on 29th April and becomes a member of the wide family of Supporters Trusts throughout the professional and non league game. We set ourselves the objective of securing 200 members in our first year and I am pleased to say we have reached that target within the first few months and now look forward to driving up membership even further with our next target being 250 by the end of 2008. We have also been successful in gaining our first

community grant from the Richmond upon Thames Borough Initiatives Grant fund to support our summer soccer school initiative to be run in conjunction with the Club.

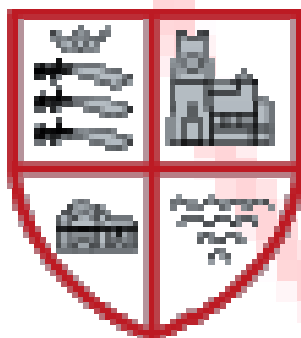
Les Rance: Press & Publicity

Soccer School Returns To Beveree.....



One of the key aims of the Trust was to promote greater community involvement with the football club and to this end the Trust are pleased to announce that Hampton & Richmond Borough FC will be holding a two week soccer fun week for 6-11 year old boys and girls in the first two weeks of August. And what is more the coaching will be free of charge! The club is able to do this following the Trust securing a grant from the Richmond upon Thames Initiatives Fund to buy equipment with which to run the soccer school.

The Club will run two one week courses with fully qualified FA coaches, one of which happens to be Hampton & Richmond Borough's Young Player of the Season, Shaun MaCauley. We are also expecting some guest

appearances from one or two other first teamers to help out with the coaching and manager Alan Devonshire will also be on hand each week, no doubt spotting Hampton players of the next generation. Activities will take place on the Beveree "top pitch" training ground from 10am to 3pm, Monday to Friday on the following dates:

- August 4th-8th
- August 11th-15th

We hope that these will be the first of regular holiday soccer coaching courses. If these two courses are successful then it is the intention of the Trust to hold

Fan Owned Clubs on the Way Up.....

Four fan owned clubs – Stockport County, Exeter City, AFC Wimbledon and FC United – have all gained promotion this season via the play offs. Supporters Direct Chairman, Brian Lomax, was quoted recently on the matter:

"What an answer to the so-called "football men" who say that supporters lack the business experience, the fundraising potential, the skills or the staying power to run a football club successfully.

This string of successes is our best advert to date, and we must make the most of it both nationally and locally. And congratulations to all concerned!"

Supporters Direct Chief Executive **Dave Boyle** further commented:

"It's fantastic to see well-run clubs achieving on the field as well as off it. They have all built their success on sustainable finances and it's important that clubs getting the sums right off the pitch get success on it."

"There's another way to getting ahead in football than having a debt-funded spending spree which might not get any success at all, but will leave a headache for the club in the future. With 40 out of 72 Football League clubs having been insolvent in the last 15 years, supporters' trust involvement is an important way to get some common sense and longer-term thinking into the game." In the report of Exeter's win at Wembley in The Times, it was remarked that "It was a financially bankrupt and morally bereft Exeter City that slid ignominiously from the Football League five years ago, but an altogether more appealing side

will grace League Two next season. Gone are the celebrity directors of Michael Jackson and Uri Geller, along with the disgraced businessmen, replaced by a supporters' trust."

And one on the brink?.....In our own league, the Blue Square Conference South, Trust owned **Cambridge City** faced an FA Appeal hearing on 28th May to find out whether they would be relegated due to failure to carry out necessary ground grading improvements at their Milton Road ground.

City have been in a long running legal dispute with their landlords, a property development company that had purchased the ground from the club's former directors. The sale was exposed in the High Court as fraudulent and the fans banded together to purchase the club.

However, unable to carry out

necessary ground grading improvements without their landlord's permission the club was relegated by the Conference to the Southern League Premier. Unfortunately the FA did not uphold the club's appeal and so Cambridge City drop down one division giving Weston super Mare their second relegation reprieve in two seasons.

Newcomers to the Conference South, **Worcester City**, have also revived their Supporters Trust following concerns regarding the possible sale of the St George Lane ground to developers. In theory the club should be swapping their existing ground for a new edge of town 6,000 seater stadium but lack of disclosure by the board has raised concerns that all is not well with the proposed development.

- Developing programmes of Community activity both at the Beveree and elsewhere to engage the Club with the Community
- To promote social inclusion within the community by providing services and facilities for all

Ticketing details including prices should be announced by the club in due course. The game will kick off at 7.30pm.

X1 will be the visitors for a 3pm kick off.

On Tuesday 22nd July Swindon Town will be the visitors for a 7.30pm start. The final home friendly, at the moment, will be on Tuesday 29th July when Brentford will be making a return visit, again 7.30pm is the kick off time. Season Ticket holders should note that it will be all pay for the West Ham and Chelsea games, but they will be able to use their season tickets for the Swindon and Brentford games. Player News.....

The first close season player movement was the shock departure of popular centre half **Alan Inns** after 5 seasons with the club, 271 appearances and 26 goals. Alan was the last but one link from the pre Alan Devonshire days along with club coach Dudley Gardner and had played a vital role in Hampton reaching a third placed finish in the league in 2007/08 and the play off finals. Alan is joining local rivals AFC Wimbledon, newly promoted to the Conference South. Manager Alan Devonshire is quoted as saying:

"I am gutted because he has done a great job for me and has been with me all the time I have been here. It came as a total surprise," he said.

"It is a shame because I didn't really want to break up the team.

"We have done so well this year - but at the end of the day that is football and we move on.

"I have already spoken to replacements. I would expect to have new signings and the rest of the squad sorted within the next four weeks.

"I don't want to start pre-season without knowing what my team is going to be."

Better news is that five of last season's squad have signed new contracts to stay at the club: **Matt Lovett, Ian Hodges, Lawrence Yaku, Dean Wells** and **Shaun MaCauley**.

The case for a trust at Hampton & Richmond Borough FC.....

The stark reality of many football Clubs at all levels of the game is that they are not viable economically without substantial subsidy from wealthy benefactors, either individuals or sponsor companies. This often leads to a "yo-yo effect" as benefactors inject and withdraw their support causing Clubs to lurch from one financial crisis to another. This has happened twice at Hampton & Richmond Borough FC within the last few years, each time the Club has been left with significant debts and in a state of financial disarray.

This is not to say that all individual backers are a bad thing. Alan Simpson OBE, our Club President has been a consistent benefactor of the Club for a forty year period and little that we have achieved could have happened without him. However, whilst fans will undoubtedly enjoy the good times they are the ones who ultimately suffer when things go wrong. Directors, shareholders, players and managers can and often do move onto other Clubs. Fans rarely change their team but often feel powerless to do

anything about the situation.

This is where a Supporters Trust comes in. The Supporters Trust movement has grown up to protect fans interests at their Clubs and have a say in the way they are run. The most powerful way to do this is by owning the Club themselves and there are now many examples of Clubs which are owned and run exclusively by the fans – Brentford, Enfield Town, Cambridge City, AFC Wimbledon for example.

The reality for Hampton & Richmond Borough playing in the Blue Square Conference South is that a Supporters Trust could not in itself raise enough funding through its individual members to sustain the costs of playing at this level on a competitive basis. However, the downside of relying on one individual is that the supporters start to develop a dependency culture where there is no incentive improve the underlying financial position of the Club as the line of least resistance is to go to the benefactors for financial handouts. It is hardly surprising in these circumstances that "he

who pays the piper calls the tune." There is, however, no reason why a football Club should be run on a different model to any other well-run business with prudent budgeting and appropriate financial controls such that the Club does not become wholly dependent on any additional injection of funds by benefactors, i.e. the Club can remain solvent if benefactors no longer wish to provide funding.

Whilst never a panacea for all the issues a Club faces, a Supporters Trust can be a means for the Club to reinvigorate supporters' interest bringing longer term benefits through wider community involvement and enfranchising the supporter base. It may also attract skills from the supporter base which can be utilized on a volunteer basis by the Club.

TRUST IN FOOTBALL

In each **Trust News**.....I will be looking at exciting Supporters Trust developments around the country and where better to start than in my homeland of Liverpool.

AFC Liverpool is a new independent football club owned by Liverpool fans and run by Liverpool fans: a genuine not for profit football club. Unlike other recent initiatives such as FC United, the creation of AFC Liverpool wasn't borne out of animosity towards Liverpool FC. On the contrary it is aimed at those Liverpool fans priced out of Premier League football. Same colours, same songs, same community of Reds. The club is meant as a grassroots addition to Liverpool FC not as a replacement for it. AFC Liverpool has also received the warm endorsement of Liverpool FC Chief Executive Rick Parry.

Managed by former Southport and Bangor City centre back Derek Goulding (who, as manager, famously masterminded Burscough FC's giant killing win over Gillingham in the 2005 FA Cup), the club is

hoping to compete next season in the Vodkat (North West Counties) League Division 2.

With credentials like that maybe Goulding would fancy trying his hand at a spot of FA Cup giant killing next season at the Beveree: stranger things have happened!!

AFC Liverpool's first ever fixture will be a friendly match against St Helens Town on Wednesday 16th July (if you go make sure you get back in time for our big one the next day!) to be played at Ashton Town's Edge Green Street Stadium with a capacity all ticket crowd of 1,000 expected.
